A Word from the Director

For the fiscal year 2019, the save rate was 94.80% overall. I said at the grand opening of the new adoption center that if you build it, they will come. This year has been an insane year for cats and kittens. We have struggled during the peak intake season with several cruelty seizures that must be held for the court proceedings. We have had up to 50 dogs at any one time on protective custody, thus tying up 50 kennels.

Our two-story Adoption Building was completed on schedule and we moved the animals in on March 1. It was an exciting time for everyone. The new building is beautiful and functional. It has a piped in cleaning system which makes it easier for the animal care specialists to clean. The building includes 48 medium – large dog kennels and 32 small dog and



puppy kennels. It also added much needed cat space.

There is still construction going on. We are adding seven more dog kennels to the outside kennels and will enclose them, so they are indoor-outdoor. This will add much needed dog capacity to the shelter. This was made possible through an endowment from a longtime volunteer who sadly passed away as well as money left in the building project. The projected completion date is December 2019. I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who donated time and money to the shelter. Without your donations, more construction cuts would have been needed.

I would also like to thank the community. This summer has been extremely trying with the number of animals we have had to house for staff, volunteers and the animals. It was difficult to maintain our no-kill status with the constant turnover of employees and the constant influx of animals. You, the community, responded to pleas for help by adopting and fostering. You are the reason we are successful and the shelter pets live to find new homes.

Thank you all for another life-saving year.

Volunteers



In my first year as the Volunteer and Foster Coordinator, there has been many changes. The Volunteer Program is now managed through a software system, Digital Cheetah. Volunteers can now log their hours, sign up for shifts, and learn more about the shelter needs through this system. Senior volunteers now have the option to sign up as a mentors where they will partner up with new volunteers. Members of the public who are over 18 years old are allowed to interact with specific dogs and cats without having to become a volunteer through our new Public Volunteer Program. We have started a Volunteer Committee that meets once a month where volunteers choose to play an active role in recruiting and retaining volunteers. Online training courses are

now available for volunteers to become an Adoption Ambassador and to gain their Yellow Handling Level for dogs.

The most successful change to the Foster Care Program was creating an online application. The online application is a great tool that allows me to reach out to potential fosters before they show up to the shelter and answer any questions they have. All the animals that go into foster are being tracked based on why they entered the program, their outcome (adoption, returned to shelter, off-site, etc.), and by their Foster Care Provider. Foster Manuals have been updated to reflect our different categories: Adult Dogs and Cats, Pregnant/Nursing Dogs and Puppies, Pregnant/Nursing Cats and Kittens. Additional training handouts have been added to the program. Senior kitten Foster Care Providers have signed up to mentor new fosters and be available for questions and training. A volunteer manages foster shelves, where donations of kitten food,

formula, and other kitten related supplies are made to the Foster Care Program. These supplies are given directly to Foster Care Providers, which allowed us to recruit and retain a large number of Foster Care Providers.

With having over 500 volunteers and 300 foster homes, these two programs have benefited greatly from having the new position, Volunteer and Foster Coordinator. Volunteers and fosters are able to have a staff member dedicated to them and aid in accomplishing their goals. I am very excited to see what the years ahead bring these programs and am very thankful for the current volunteers and fosters for all their hard work.

Supporters spent the night playing at six casino game tables, enjoying the heavy snacks, relaxing with a drink, and ogling over the impressive car collection.

This event replaced the annual spring fundraiser, the Woof, Walk, and Wrun.
















Total Intake of all Animals




